

Human Trafficking

Trafficking in persons, also known as modern slavery or human trafficking, includes both forced labor and sex trafficking. Human trafficking represents a threat to international peace and security. It undermines the rule of law, robs millions of their dignity and freedom, enriches transnational criminals and terrorists, and threatens public safety and national security everywhere. By some estimates, as many as 24.9 million people — adults and children — are trapped in human trafficking worldwide, including in the United States. Instability caused by natural disasters, conflict, or a pandemic can increase opportunities for traffickers to exploit others. (source:

GIVING CHILDREN HOPE

Thank you to all our wonderful Volunteers for participating in our 2023 kickoff volunteering event at Giving Children Hope (GCH). We had a great turnout with 14 Volunteers! Through the GCH We've Got Your Back Program, over 500 backpacks get delivered to 88 schools across Orange, Los Angeles, and San Bernardino Counties on a weekly basis. The backpacks provide families with nutritional food for the weekend. They are filled with essential food items, including canned goods, pasta, rice, beans, dried fruit, and nuts. Our Volunteers grabbed a shopping cart and helped fill over 275 backpacks. We also had the opportunity to prep the backpacks for packing, which consisted of inspecting the backpacks for wear & tear as well as cleaning about 150 backpacks. We're scheduled to volunteer at GCH on the last Tuesday of each month, and our next date is February 28th. REACH FOUNDATION 5K

I have been contacted by the REACH Foundation about organizing a Yorba Linda Woman's Club Team for their upcoming 5K fundraiser. Consider this your personal invitation! Proceeds benefit PYLUSD students, including the Middle School Track Meet, Educator Grants, STEAM Programs and more!

Turns out there is something special about walking 10,000 steps a day. As we have begun a new year, I thought this would be good Health & Wellness news to share. Below is a Web MD article from October 5, 2022.

It became conventional wisdom, in many fitness circles a few years ago, that we should all try to take 10,000 steps a day. With daily fitness trackers keeping count, many people tried to hit that number - and some occasionally wondered if 10,000 was, in fact, some kind of important number. Turns out: Yes, it is, according to new research. A study found that walking about 10,000 steps a day was linked to less cardiovascular disease (heart disease, stroke and heart failure), 13 types of cancer, and dementia. Taking 10,000 steps is about the same as walking four or five miles, depending on your stride. Still, the new research says you don't have to take that many to get health benefits. For example, 9,800 steps lower the risk of dementia by 50 percent, the research suggests, but taking just 3,800 a day lowers it by 25 percent. A companion study in the JAMA Internal Medicine Journal found that, for every 2,000 steps a day, you could lower your risk of premature death by 8% to 11%. "Both studies involved about 78,500 participants, all middle age and older, who wore a device on their wrist to measure physical activity and whose health was monitored for a median of seven years," the Washington Post reported. A higher intensity of walking increased the health benefits, too, the studies found. "Walking at a faster pace was linked to a lower risk for dementia, heart disease, cancer and early death, beyond the benefit accrued for the number of daily steps," The Post wrote. "The take-home message here is that, for protective health benefits, people could not only ideally aim for 10,000 steps a day but also aim to walk faster," said colead author Matthew Ahmadi, research fellow at the University of Sydney.
