Parliamentarian

Bylaws Article VII Section 11

WHAT IS A CONSENT AGENDA?

A consent agenda groups items typically found in a full agenda. All of the items are then presented to the general membership, in a single motion for an up or down vote, after allowing anyone to request that a specific item be moved to the full agenda for individual attention.

Why would an organization want to use a consent agenda?

Consent agendas are popular with many nonprofit organizations because they help streamline meetings and **allow the focus to be on primary matters**. Items are typically discussed at length during a committee or board meeting, before recommending they be placed on a consent agenda.

What does it mean if we adopt/approve a consent agenda?

- A vote on the single motion applies to all the items on the consent agenda.

What does it **not** mean if we adopt/approve a consent agenda?

- Consent agendas do not make it easier to ramrod through decisions, since all items on the consent agenda are still open to discussion and debate, if someone requests they be moved to the full agenda.
- It is not always necessary to remove an item from the consent agenda, if people have simple questions or wish to discuss the item further. Discussion is permitted **after** the **motion for approval** is made, **but before the vote**. However, everyone should remember that extensive conversation **defeats the purpose of the consent agenda**.

What normally is found on a consent agenda?

- Routine, informational, procedural and self-explanatory items are generally placed on the consent agenda. These typically are such things as:
- Correspondence requiring no action
- Committee reports
- Approval of contracts that fall within the organization's policy guidelines
- Final approval of proposals that have been **thoroughly** discussed previously by the board, and where the board is comfortable with the recommendations
- Confirmation of documents or actions that need no discussion but are required by the bylaws

UPDATE VETNET WARDROBES

Update on our Partnership with VetNet/Working Wardrobes!

In April, Working Wardrobes hosted their signature event – Power UP for Success: a day of transformation for Service Members preparing to transition to civilian life. With the support of our community partners, sponsors and volunteers, 75 Marines from 31 different command elements across Camp Pendleton were served. The resources included hearing from a panel of Veterans who shared Military skills application and their own transition into civilian life – plus networking opportunities, a job fair, professional wardrobing, and headshots.

The Yorba Linda Woman's Club has supported this effort by donating MANY items of professional attire to this cause. In September, we contributed over \$450 worth of office-appropriate clothing to Working Wardrobes – and in November (our focus on Veterans month), our contributions totaled over \$1,000 in value. Our recent April donations exceeded those amounts, requiring TWO cars to transport the clothing to the Irvine Donation Center. **We contributed over \$1,300 in additional clothing, shoes, and accessories, bringing our total to \$2,750 in value for these Veterans!**
